## From the Desk of the NAN Moderator

Brothers and Sisters,

Let's tell it like it is: In 1968, while addressing the Bishops in the United States, then Cardinal Karol Wojtyla prophetically stated, "We are now facing the final confrontation between the Church and the anti-Church, of the Gospel

versus the anti-Gospel.... We must be prepared to undergo great trials in the not-too-distant future..." How do we prepare ourselves for these times and how do we know what to do? In 1969 Cardinal Ratzinger said, "You have heard correctly; but I maintain that reflection upon history, properly understood, embraces both looking back into the past and, with that as the starting point, reflecting on the possibilities and tasks of the future, which can only become clear if we survey a fairly long stretch of the road and do not naively shut ourselves up in the present." So, what is our "starting point"? – the Apostolic Age, the age of the Apostles and the early Church.

Both St. Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI also gave us a glimpse into the present. Benedict XVI, as a Cardinal in 1969, saw the surprise gift for these times: "But suddenly here was something that no one had planned. Here the Holy Spirit himself had, so to speak,

taken the floor. The faith was reawakening precisely among the young, who embraced it without ifs, ands, or buts, without escape hatches and loopholes, and who experienced it in its totality as a precious, life-giving gift." And he added: "Only when the person is struck and opened up by Christ in his inmost depth can the other also be inwardly touched, can there be reconciliation in the Holy Spirit, can true community grow."

So, where do we stand in light of these quotations? Let me say we have to sharpen our awareness of these

times – these are
Apostolic times –
and with that
awareness we
must fully enter
the call the Lord has

placed on our lives. This is why our February conference is named: "Living an Abundant Life in an Apostolic Age". We have been given, what was quoted above: "the Holy Spirit himself had, so to speak, taken the floor". So, let's continue to open our doors to the young who have been called to work with us for the future of the Body of Christ. They

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## Movemenets as Tugboats

David Peterman, Sr. shared this vision and a fuller interpretation at the Christian Community of God's Delight Gathering on October 22, 2022. An abridged interpretation and teaching is shared here.

#### Vision:

I had a vision of a huge ship in a stormy sea. Around this ship were many small tugboats trying to move the ship in a new direction. As I looked ahead of its path, I saw through a fog that there were huge rocks ahead.

#### **Interpretation**:

This huge, ocean liner type ship is the Body of Christ, the whole Church. We, the passengers, are ill-prepared for the global changes that are happening in our society and our world (See: From Christendom to Apostolic Mission). I saw the ship unknowingly sailing towards rocks in a stormy sea. Our lives as Christians (faith, family, and community) are facing devastating destruction.

God has intervened in the past century to help His divided people in grave danger. Seventy years ago, the "captain" (Pope John XXIII) of this "ship "(whole Church) saw the danger coming and called the Church together to

prepare to change direction. Successive popes have shared clear, early warning prophetic messages to keep the Church on a safe way forward. But their warnings and directions have been largely ignored. As a result, huge cracks in the ship's hull (protective prohibitions) opened that have grown into a flood of unintended consequences: the sexual revolution, loss of protective moral barriers of truth, agnostic, secular culture; individualism, unbelief, rejection of authority, loss of

tradition and wisdom from the past.

At the same time, many faithful passengers, responding to the Holy Spirit, have joined in tugboats (renewal movements like Charismatic Renewal) to reestablish the ship's course, turn it away from these dangers, and correct the Church's overall direction.

We who have been blessed to live in Charismatic Covenant Communities don't recognize how important we are as a body. In the 1960s many of us thought about ourselves

as individuals. But Baptism in the Holy Spirit, Bible study, and God's grace changed our hearts into thinking about being part of God's people. We have been struggling ever since to hold on to that conversion, that change of thinking that we are a part of the Body of Christ (1 Cor 12). We have come to have that collective, people of God, Body of Christ, temple of the Holy Spirit mindset. We who are living Jesus' life in the Spirit should be showing the world the true Gospel message of surrender of self to God's call and plan for our salvation.

Even though the Church has started to realize that she is a participation in the Trinitarian Koinonia, a "communion,", as individuals we remain separated by historical thinking, habits, and upbringing. Yet God's Holy Spirit is at work awakening a spiritual basis for restoring unity as a Trinitarian Communion, a community of saints. Individually, we are just beginning to dig



down to this understanding, this meaning of Church as the assembly of God's holy ones. We're not there, but we have clearly glimpsed those rocks ahead of us. We should be working hard to steer this whole ship, especially our tugboat, away from those rocks.

So, when we pray, let us pray for the Body of Christ that is broken, hurting, and under attack everywhere, physically, spiritually, and mentally. We should be warriors in the battle. Even if we can't take up arms, we can raise our arms as Moses did (Ex 17:11) praising God, worshiping him, and begging him (2 Chron 7:14) for the mercy of salvation for his people, on his ship the Church.

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# What I Sense the Holy Spirit is Saying

### John Fisher and Thomas More: Keeping Their Souls While Loosing Their Heads

by Robert J. Conrad, Jr.

As I read (and reread) this short book, I ask myself, "Would I risk love for the truth, or would I play it safe?" Written by trial judge Robert J. Conrad, this publication from 2021 takes a fresh look at the familiar

story of King Henry VIII and his bid for a divorce from Queen Catherine of Aragon so that he could marry Anne Boleyn. It looks into all the ramifications of this event, delving into the opposition of Cardinal John Fisher and King Henry's former Lord Chancellor, Sir

Thomas More, resulting in their martyrdom. The reader also gets to know another player, their friend Father Erasmus.

The focus is on Fisher and More: their characters, their consciences formed by the Word of God

and the Church, their use of silence, and

Conrad's book is the Dutch theologian and humanist Erasmus, a friend of both Fisher and More. Erasmus articulates why he cannot be a martyr: "Mine was never the spirit to risk my life

for the truth. Not everyone has the strength needed for martyrdom. I fear that, if strife were to break out, I shall behave like Peter. When popes and emperors make the right decision I follow, which is godly, if they decide wrongly, I tolerate them, which is safe."

Thus, Conrad forces all of us to confront our own ideas and feelings about blood martyrdom and effectively to choose between Fisher and More on the one side and Erasmus on the other. Do we risk our
